## **OPENING CEREMONY AND INTRODUCTION TO NSS**

They facilitated work for new students by arranging them in a queue, checking their documents, giving them the basic details and sending them for scrutiny of forms and payment of fees.

### **2)NSS ORIENTATION**

The NSS journey’s first meeting was held on 27<sup>th</sup>July where new members,senior members, leaders and teachers in-charge were introduced to each other.They were briefed about the classification of 120 hours of community service and what NSS exactly is and given their work cards. They were also prepared for the events lined up.

### **3)WORLD YOGA DAY IN COLLEGE**

It was organized by the many committees of Jai Hind College known as Spandan. The yoga master held a successful session of yoga with students present. Students took it as fun activity rather than just an exercise. It was thought of as a way of living. Every student enjoyed it.

### **4)RAGGING PROHIBITION COMMITTEE SEMINAR**

The students were given a small introduction to the activities of the Ragging Prohibition Committee and information about the types of ragging and how to prevent it.

### **5)ANTI TOBACCO FRIENDSHIP DAY CELEBRATIONS**

The NSS unit along with Salaam Bombay Foundation carried out an Anti-tobacco signature campaign in the college campus on friendship day to spread the message of tobacco prevention amongst the youth.

### **6)INDEPENDENCE DAY CELEBRATIONS**

The flag hoisting ceremony was held in college on 15<sup>th</sup> August. The principal Dr. Ashok Wadia hoisted the flag which was followed by a cultural programme where the members of NSS along with junior college students performed dances and sang patriotic songs. The NSS members also expressed their views in the form of speeches and poems. The principal also gave a motivational speech on freedom struggle.

### **7)SEMINAR ON SEXUAL HARASSMENT**

The Sexual Harassment Prohibition Committee in collaboration with NSS unit organized an activity session called "POSTER GIRL". The idea was to blend voices and talk about this cause, treating Sexual harassment as a process, and not merely an event. It also focused on slangs used, the places popular for such instances, experience of the victims, etc. Many girls also shared their experiences.

### **8)TALK ON WOMEN TRAFFICKING**

A session was conducted in our college to throw light on the biggest issue of today's India: women trafficking. A surprise drill was conducted by the speaker to highlight women's dependence on men and to show what a woman lacks within her.

### **9)UMEED –ANNUAL SOCIO CULTURAL PROGRAM**

The NSS unit in association with Jai Hind Social Club and an NGO littleMORE organized the annual socio cultural programme - Umeed. It included dance performances, music and plays. The theme of the programme was 'Celebrating Life' and as a part of the theme, 30 cancer patients from Tata Memorial Hospital were invited as guests.

## **10) REPUBLIC DAY CELEBRATIONS**

The Republic Day celebrations started off with the flag hoisting by the students and the singing of the National Anthem. Enthusiasm was fueled by a dance performance, touching poems, singing performances and also a play on “consumer rights”.

## **11) NSS CLOSING CEREMONY**

The year finally ended with the Closing ceremony of NSS where all the members spoke about their experiences and indulged in thoughtful and fun activities. The senior members who completed their second year of NSS spoke about their entire journey and the ceremony ended on an emotional note.

## **AREA BASED EVENTS**

### **1) TREE PLANTATIONS**

Taking environment wellness into sight, afforestation was conducted at various places. Student volunteers planted saplings. Aarey Milk Colony, Dockyard Road and Anjuman Shaan-E-Millat Urdu High school at Goregaon were some of the sites. More than 150 trees were planted collectively.

### **2) WASTE TO KNOWLEDGE PROJECT (W2K)**

This innovative project comprised of collecting old newspapers from the citizens and then later using them for education of poor, under-privileged children. The project was held in Mumbai Central on various days.

### **3) BLOOD DONATION CAMPS**

With a vision of collecting maximum units of blood, this year, for the first time the NSS unit of Jai Hind College organized two blood donation camps at an interval of four months. The first blood donation camp conducted in the month of June had thalassemia testing along with blood donation. It was a combined effort of the NSS team along with the Mahatma Gandhi Seva Mandir Blood Bank. HDFC Bank Ltd. sponsored the second camp in December. In the first camp we collected 133 units of blood and in second camp we collected 96 units. Young donors from all over the college as well as the people from around the college participated for the noble cause. Volunteers helped in motivating the donors as well as providing them with light snacks and certificates.

#### **4)CARF AWARENESS DRIVES**

A social organization named Cancer Research and Aid Foundation(CARF) undertook awareness drives at various petrol pumps in Mahim, Lower Parel, and Worli and Mahalaxmi. Student volunteers, with the permission of the drivers stuck stickers on their cars which promoted antismoking and anticancer messages.

#### **5)HIROSHIMA DAY PEACE RALLY**

NSS units of different colleges gathered together for the rally, to commemorate the Hiroshima Bombings and spread the message of peace. It was conducted on 6<sup>th</sup> August. The rally started at Azad Maidan and ended at Flora fountain, Hutatma Chowk.

#### **6)INTERNATIONAL SUICIDE PREVENTION DAY EVENT**

On 10<sup>th</sup> September 2015, an event was organized in University Of Mumbai at Fort. There was a talk about suicides and the usual stigma that prevails. Discussion regarding prevention of suicide was carried on further.

#### **7)SUICIDE PREVENTION FLASH MOB**

NSS volunteers from different colleges in collaboration with an NGO, Samaritans performed a flash mob in various colleges like Jai Hind College, Sophia College and SIES College as well as public places like Carter road and Juhu. Their main aim was to spread awareness regarding prevention of suicides and to offer a helping hand to people in their blues. The flash mob was a great success.

#### **8)CLEAN UP DRIVES**

Inspired by the Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan, various clean up drives were organized on various occasions at different places. Volunteers helped in cleaning the beaches (Girgaon Chowpatty) during Ganesh Visarjan. There was segregation of waste into biodegradable and non-biodegradable wastes. Another such drive along with the students and staff of Anjuman Shaan-E-Millat Urdu High school was held at their school. Students with gloves and masks cleaned the area for a better environment.

#### **9)CROWD MANAGEMENT**

NSS volunteers helped the Mumbai Police in managing crowd on various instances during the Ganpati Visarjan at Girgaon Chowpatty.

#### **10)MUMBAI POLICE SENIOR CITIZEN REGISTRATION DRIVE**

As a part of the initiative to engage students in daily proceedings that take place in police station, NSS volunteers helped the Mumbai Police in Senior Citizen Registration Project. Volunteers collected information about the senior citizens as well as the helping hands working at their place

from 25 societies allotted by the Marine Drive Police Station. This project was to ensure safety of senior citizens.

### **11)MARINE LINES RAILWAY STATION ADOPTION PROJECT**

This was one of the major area based projects. The project was a way to develop and improve the Marine Lines Station. Various events like cleanup drives and awareness about emergency numbers were done under this project. Suggestions from daily travelers on improving railway facilities were also inculcated. The walls were also painted to beautify the station as well as spread social messages.

### **12) LEADERSHIP FEST**

CORO held a leadership fest to mark its 25<sup>th</sup> anniversary. NSS volunteers joined the fest. Various stalls were put up to inform people about various social issues and CORO's efforts in solving those. Sessions were held by various resource persons on the same. Leaders from different districts were felicitated as well for their eminent work in their respective districts.

### **13)NSS COMMUNITY CONNECT FELLOWSHIP (CCF)**

NSS CCF consisted of two parts: the volunteer phase and the Community Connect Phase. The various skill sessions included sessions on integrity, mindfulness, the use of an appreciative lens, etc., and helped enhance our Community Connect Phase where we chose a community, connected with them, listened to and sensed their problems, encouraged to actively try and to solve them, while assisting them with the same. With our volunteers, we filed and solved civic complaints using BMC's helpline number – 1916, while also conducting skill sessions for them. The two big events organized were, "A Talk for the City" at Azad Maidan, where we interacted with BMC officials and interested citizens about our city and its issues and how we could solve them; and CO(ME)UNITY Connect; an Awareness Campaign at Shivaji Park where citizens were encouraged to interact and share through various activities.

### **14)RED RIBBON CLUB (RRC)**

RRC is a unique solution to conquer the myths, fear and ignorance about HIV/AIDS. This was the most informative area based project. The main aim of this project was to spread awareness about HIV/AIDS and inform people about its cures and preventive measures. A rally was conducted in Wadala about the same. Student volunteers took surveys from people regarding HIV/AIDS and conducted various competitions like poetry writing, poster making, essay writing, debate and elocution competitions, quiz competition, scavenger hunt and slogans to spread awareness about the same. As a part of the project, volunteers also took kids of NGO NAVJEEVAN to hanging gardens for a fun day and provided them with snacks.

### **15) CAREER COUNSELING AND LEADERSHIP TRAINING**

Career counseling was organized for young students of Anjuman Shaan-E-Millat Urdu High school. NSS volunteers guided these students in shaping their path for future studies. Idea about various competitive exams and various sections in each field was thoroughly explained to them. Students were enlightened over management of time as well as balancing other activities along with academics. Along with counseling, briefings about leadership qualities were also shared.

### **16) MEN AGAINST VIOLENCE AND ABUSE (MAVA) EVENT**

The event was in remembrance of the Nirbhaya Gang Rape case. In commemoration of the brave soul that survived our memories, MAVA along with *Beti Zindabad Initiative of ActionAid* organized a special program on 16<sup>th</sup> December, 2016. NSS volunteers from many colleges participated in the program. Renowned personalities were part of this event as well.

### **17) CHAKACHAK BANDRA**

To strive for a better and clean Bandra, ChakaChak Bandra along with volunteers from various colleges geared up for a cleanliness drive at Bandra Station. The drive was supported by the Indian Development Foundation (IDF) as well. It included cleaning the station especially the slum sided areas along with repainting work at the bridges. A short documentary was also filmed by “For Young India” about the event. The event was a small step towards a big change.

### **18) CHRISTMAS CELEBRATIONS WITH UNDERPRIVILEGED KIDS**

NSS volunteers became Santa for a day on Christmas Eve by spreading goodness, smiles and happiness among underprivileged kids of Sant Gadge Maharaj Dharmshala at Dadar. They helped up setting up toy shelf for the kids. Volunteers enjoyed and played with the kids making their Christmas worth remembering. It was jointly organized by IDF and Council for Cancer Care.

### **19) TATA MEMORIAL HOSPITAL PROJECT**

This was another important area based project. It was in collaboration with an NGO, ‘little MORE’, working for aid of cancer patients. It was a month long project. The project involved interacting with kids suffering from cancer. Apart from this, the volunteers also helped the hospital staff in managing the online registration of new patients, data sheet entries and managing patient entries. They were also the part of Tata Hospital’s Deepawali Entertainment Programme where in they helped the NGO in distributing goodie bags to all the patients attending the program.

### **20) CITIZEN REACH OUT PROGRAMME**

The Citizen Reach Out Programme was organized by Indian Development Foundation to mark the end of the year. It was joined by the leprosy patients at Vimala Centre. Cultural events along with felicitation of IDF workers were conducted.

The campaign's aim is to bring out the reality of those taxi drivers who refuse to take their customers for short distances or refuse to tender back exact change. The project was carried out in Jai Hind College, around Marine Drive, around other colleges such as H.R. College, K.C. College, and also at Bharda's New High School. The RCJC team also wrote down taxi numbers of taxis and rickshaws who had violated this rule. At the end, with a figure of around 15,000 signatures this year, the signed sheets were submitted to the Road Traffic Organization (R.T.O), Mumbai Central.
- 4) **DANCING WITH THE STARS**: Dancing with the Stars was an event where RCJC spent the evening with the senior citizens of 'The Society Of Our Lady Of Piety' at Vijaywadi. A small dancing and singing session was done with them and food items were also distributed.
- 5) **SILVER LINING**: Silver Lining is the Rotaract Club of Jai Hind College's three year old initiative. The initiative extends for 3 months where RCJC volunteers taught the children of the Akanksha foundation.
- 6) **SPOTLIGHT**: Spotlight is the Rotaract Club of Jai Hind College's flagship project conducted this year. This was the SECOND time it was done for cancer patients. Spotlight of this year was a Fashion Show in which the participants of fashion show were

the Cancer Survivors, Thalesemia kids and street kids. The fashion show took place at Infiniti Mall, Malad and its impact reached out to an audience of 5,000 people.

- 7) COTTON BAG MOVEMENT: The Cotton Bag Movement is an initiative where RCJC promote the lesser usage of plastic by painting and selling cotton bags. The RCJC team paint and sell cotton bags at different rotary clubs of other colleges.
- 8) BATTI BANDH: The aim was to conserve electricity by watching a cricket match together. This also gave the opportunity to all the society members to come down, watch the match together and shut all the lights in their house. This also increased the bonding amongst the members of the society.

The Cell was inaugurated by Principal Dr Ashok Wadia on 12<sup>th</sup> February 2016. This was followed by a talk for the students, by the counselor, Mrs Mahek Punjabi on “BODY IMAGE - DON’T BUY THE LIE”. It was very well received and the students requested for many more sessions to be conducted

On 18<sup>th</sup> March 2016, a talk on “Life Skills” was conducted for the Class III employees and on 30<sup>th</sup> March 2016, a similar talk was conducted for the Class IV employees by the in-house counselor.

On 9<sup>th</sup> April 2016, speakers from Chinmaya Mission were invited to conduct a talk for teachers on “Emotional Transformation”

### **Title of Practice:**

Inculcation of a Research Culture at Jai Hind College

### **Goal:**

To enhance research culture among faculty and students as per current needs of India and to compete as an excellent research institute on global map.

**The Context:**

Jai Hind is an under graduate college with a handful of departments with post graduate courses. In spite of being an undergraduate college, faculty and students are actively involved in research. To boost this activity institute took several initiatives.

**The Practice:**

The College applied for grants to DST under FIST. We received a sum of Rs 70,00,000/-. The Center for Research was established with UGC and FIST grants and help rendered by an alumnus, Mr. Mitesh Desai. The Centre for Research was inaugurated at the hands of the newly appointed Vice Chancellor Dr Sanjay Deshmukh.

It is state of art centre with high end instruments like Veego Melting Point apparatus ,Gibson fraction collector, Shimadzu Spectroflurimeter ,Shimatzu Differential scanning colorimeter Bioera gel rocker , HPLC, Rotary Evaporator, Refrigerated Centrifuge, Nanovoltmeter , Rotary shaker Incubator with temperature variation ,PCR machine and Gel doc. The working of double distillation unit was explained to the faculty as well as nonteaching staff.

To gain the confidence of faculty and PhD scholars a series of workshops were organized. Through collaborations with S. Kant, (LCGC), Chempure, Eureka Forbes, & Nirmala Niketan College of Home Science the teachers are now able to carry out research in the various fields.

Jai Hind College has signed an MOU with LCGC chrom consumables LLP which enable faculty to use facilities of LCGC for testing samples using high end instruments not available at Jai Hind College and also undertake hands – on training of instruments.

A talk on HPLC by Dr Sanjay Dhuri expert on HPLC from LCGC chrom consumable LLP was organized for science faculty and HPLC was demonstrated by Mr Ketan Sawant with samples of PhD scholars on HPLC instrument in centre for research in Jai Hind College. One faculty member is presently undergoing training of HPLC who in turn will be in house resource who will train faculty and students. Hands- on- training of HPLC was organized three times by Agilent technologies. Teachers and PhD scholars took advantage of this opportunity.

Mr Mitesh Desai director of LCGC chrom consumables LLP who is alumnus has donated seven lacks towards purchase of chemicals, glassware and equipment. He also helped design the interior of the centre for research. With his generosity stakeholders of the Science faculty will be immensely benefited.

To enhance interest of research in Science students a workshop on instruments was conducted for the students of the FY and SYBSc classes. Hands on training was given for using Rotary evaporator, melting point / boiling point apparatus, probe sonicator and binocular microscope

with camera. The process of synthesis of nanoparticles with magnetic stirrer was also included. The number of student beneficiaries were 38. JHC faculty trained the students.

The management is proactive and supports the research activities by providing financial aid to faculty pursuing research work for PhD and teachers are given concession in time for their research work.

### **Evidence of Success**

With the facilities available in the Center for Research faculty and students have taken up the challenge of increasing the quality and quantity of Research carried out at Jai Hind College. Many faculty members have applied for the BCUD / UGC minor projects. Many participate in International and National conferences and present the research work. Students attend competitions like Avishkar, Jigyasa, Collosum, etc.

### **Problems Encountered And Resources Required:**

The main limitation is running cost of the equipments. Chemicals and consumables needed are expensive and money needs to be generated to support this activity.

College has undertaken following steps towards generation of funds

- Science departments are applying to DBT for Star College Award to get grants for the purchase of instruments, chemicals and consumables.
- Another problem encountered is maintenance of these high – end instruments. Steps are being taken towards the appointment of a fulltime technician who will monitor the smooth functioning of the laboratory.
- The Principal is also supporting the enhancement of research in the college by sending faculty to get trained and use high end instruments.
