

11 May to 13 May 2020

E-Shodh was featured as an online research meet by the IQAC department of Jai Hind College during the lockdown period. It was a national level research meet conducted from 11 May to 13 May 2020 where students all across India got an opportunity to present their research work. The theme decided for the same was, "Impact of COVID - 19 on economy, society, international politics, Higher education, literature, media, personal or Public Health, Psychology, Management, e - commerce, Mobility, technology, research, entrepreneurship, Tourism, Research and Innovation". The online research meet received spectacular response from students across the country. Research papers were received from various universities from states such as Goa, West Bengal, Tamil Nadu etc. The colleges participated from various parts of the country were Modern College (Pune), Hindu College & Indraprastha College for Women (Delhi) Vellore Institute of technology (VIT) (Chennai), BITS Pilani (Rajasthan), Bhairab Gangully College (West Bengal). Some of the reputed institutes from Mumbai which participated in the event were Mithibai College, St. Xaviers College, K.J.Somaiya College and Sophia College.

The total number of registrations received were 308. The total number of abstracts received were 187. The total number of papers received were 142 out of which papers received from the Arts department were 52 UG & 04 PG. The Commerce department sent in 50 UG & 05 PG papers where as the Science department sent in 24 UG & 07 PG papers. The total number of papers presented during the research meet were 131..

The enthusiasm shown by the young and budding researchers was truly commendable. We would like to acknowledge one such young researcher from St. Xavier's College who despite being visually impaired had shown perseverance and had enlightened the students with the impact of COVID – 19 on visually impaired people.

The team of judges were a combination of one internal judge and two external judges. Each paper was carefully evaluated by a team of three judges at a time.

The meet was inaugurated on 13 May 2020 by Dr. Annama Anil, Co-ordinator, DBT-ICT Center for excellence for EneergyBiosciences. She spoke on "How to scientific research Paper". She gave valuable insights on how to increase your publication standard, what is expected from editors, reviewers, why one should publish the paper, how to discriminate your research finding to common unity. The importance of H-index, citation index how it is checked. Good knowledge base and good plan is authors responsibility. She also explained the actual paper content and its flow and as to how the title of the paper should be, guidelines for selecting key words from an abstract and the bibliography. This was not only knowledge booster for participants but also for the teachers.

The Valedictory speech was given by our Principal, Dr. Ashok Wadia who congratulated all the researchers for their paper presentation, ideas and innovations and also appreciated their interest in research. The results of the research meet were announced by Dr. Devangi Chachad.

E - Research Meet Report

(IQAC Criteria-III (Research & Extension) Committee)

The E-Shodh Research Meet shattered the glass ceiling of research by promoting collaborative and interdisciplinary work during these difficult times of the COVID-19 pandemic. Undergraduate and postgraduate students from various parts of the country participated in the meet to have the golden opportunity of presenting their papers to accomplished personalities in the field.

However, the research meet was not restricted to one field. It gave freedom to students from any academic background to choose a topic which they favoured and write a paper on it. As expected, the students engaged in high-quality, collaborative, and interdisciplinary work. Several even chose to work on topics different from their field to make this a more wholesome experience.

Arts

The coronavirus pandemic has impacted the world as a whole. Papers which focused on the topics related to the Arts stream collectively expressed the jeopardy caused by the pandemic. While science is the first thing that may strike the mind when thinking about the coronavirus, these papers highlighting the psychological, mental, social, and cultural implications of the same.

Several papers were received which highlighted the psychological and social impact of the pandemic and the subsequent lockdown. Since a lockdown of this magnitude has never been implemented, it came as a shock to many.

So, numerous papers focused on the mental health of the different sects of people – such as students, employees, daily wage earners, farmers, the poor and even a general perspective on the impact via surveys and other mediums. A group chose to interview doctors and other health workers to establish their mind-frame during these difficult times.

Mental health at home was also addressed, by emphasising on topics such as domestic violence and any impact on familial relations. A paper was also received by a visually-impaired student, highlighting the impact the pandemic has had on their academic opportunities and higher education. Some postgraduate papers focused on the aspect of conformity to explain the illness symptoms experienced by healthy individuals. The effect of the pandemic on society has been damaging. Keeping that in mind, some papers chose to emphasise how society has transformed in the last couple of months. These papers included topics like international policies, world relations and globalisation, which were analysed and assessed, with appropriate measures to minimise the damage.

A few papers focused on how the general overview of China has changed with the incoming of the virus. The students have analysed the accountability of the Chinese government and the dominance asserted by China since it is the first country which has nearly eradicated the disease. One paper surrounded the topic of xenophobia, highlighting the treatment of the Chinese and racial outcome of the disease.

Science

The scientific community of this generation faced their hardest challenge with the coronavirus pandemic. The pandemic could not have been predicted by the greatest minds in science and could not be contained due to the inherent ability of the virus. It was now a necessity to analyse the impact of the pandemic and the future of the field. Thus, young minds embarked on a journey to facilitate this movement.

The papers based on science chose a variety of topics to analyse. Research methods such as interviews, surveys and reviews of the literature were undertaken. Several hypotheses concerning the spread of the virus were proposed. Some papers revealed the true nature and behaviour of the virus and the spread of the disease. Analysis of the impact of virus on the scientific community was achieved, with emphasis on the research and therapeutic sector.

Many papers focused on the myths surrounding the coronavirus and debunked them, with appropriate scientific information and justification. A study was also formulated on how the COVID-19 pandemic had propelled the research and innovation in India and even on a global scale. A group did a comparative study and listed the strategies implemented by renounced countries to contain the spread of the disease. While the results of the strategies were varied, the paper proposed plausible explanations for the same.

A winning paper emphasised on the drawbacks of the Indian healthcare system and how has impacted the situation. It has critically analysed the limitation of resources needed to eradicate the virus. Lastly, it has postulated solutions and areas the Indian government must focus on hereon forward. Therapeutics was also one of the frontrunners. Some papers suggested therapeutics while others critically reviewed the techniques. Therefore, a complete evaluation of the influence of the pandemic on the scientific sector, working, its eradication as well as its limitations were revealed by the papers that were selected.

Commerce

The COVID-19 pandemic has affected the world like no other event recorded in the bygone times. Since the commerce sector comprises of the wheels of the world, each paper received was unique focusing on how the pandemic has hindered the growth of several industries.

Given that the world economy is in a jeopardy, the papers went beyond the economy and emphasised on specific industries such as the travel industry, aviation, education, IT, and agriculture. Some papers even recommended ways in which the respective sector can recuperate from the pandemic.

Other unique topics such as the role of social media were also discussed. The pros and cons of the influence of social networking apps during these difficult times were critically analysed. The recent issue of misleading messages from these apps was also addressed and dissected. A winning paper described how this pandemic paved a way for these apps to connect people during the times of social distancing.

Emphasis was laid on the effect of the pandemic on education and the outcomes of distance learning. Restricted opportunities for higher education were also explored. One paper evaluated the amenities for the poor and homeless during such a time and revealed the efficiency of the steps taken by the government to protect the poor.

Employment in many industries was also a complex topic that was dealt with. A well-appreciated paper highlighted the impact of the pandemic on the newspaper industry. Some assessed the abrupt change in consumer behaviour and its subsequent impact on businesses and ultimately, on the stock markets. An all-round assessment of the commerce sectors was observed through surveys, interviews, and bibliometrics analysis.

Department of B. Voc Travel & Tourism

Due to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic, Dubai Expo 2020 has been postponed to 2021 and the rescheduled new dates calls for an opening on October 1, 2021. However, the online lecture discussed about the plans which were made for Expo 2020. The talk gave the virtual tour of country Ice land and other main points such as stays, attractions, various routes to be followed, weather, transport, costing etc. It gave insights about what all events will be organised and how things will be managed. The attractions and routes and the cost of Dubai Expo 2020.

Expo 2020 is a World Expo to be hosted by Dubai in the United Arab Emirates, originally scheduled to open on October 20, 2020, and to end on April 10, 2021. It also gave insights about the various routes and itinerary that can be followed as tour operators and tour guides in Canada. Now this information will be helpful in the early planning of the postponed event.

Department of Microbiology


The covid-19 lockdown was a learning period for the Microbiology department. The following initiatives were taken by the department for teachers and students.

Lecture: Relevance of Microbiology in changing Times

The Department of Microbiology organized a talk on 'Relevance of Microbiology in changing Times' by Mr. Amit Rao for the students of all First, Second and Third-year BSc class on 04th May 2020.

Besides our alumnus, Mr. Amit Rao is an entrepreneur and well-known name in the field of biologics. Had his MSc degree from Haffkine Institute, which is one of the famous institutes of Mumbai. Mr. Rao has been working with a lot of multinational companies which produce biology products. He is also a member of our Board of Studies.

The objective of the talk was to engage students during this time of Covid 19 and giving them an insight about the role of microbiologists in different fields. There was an overwhelming response from the students, with 54 participants. Through this interactive session students were enlightened about the various opportunities for a Microbiologist and how they can play an active role helping out the society for betterment during such crisis.

Department Philosophy





Department of Philosophy kept engaging students in various ways. First, emotionally a lot of support was given to each student by counselling them. Secondly, many sessions were taken of students to calm them down and empower them to have control over anxiety-related issues. This was done through guided meditations and using techniques of philosophical importance given in Bhagwad Gita of Karma Yoga (motivating them to take proactive steps like doing charity, serving the needy, etc.), Jyana Yoga (intellectually tackling every challenge of life) and Bhakti Yoga (seeking answers through the process of devotion).

The Mandala Making activity which is a Buddhist Meditative Art Therapy was done from the beginning of the lockdown period and is still going on. Students make beautiful mandalas which help them to maintain focus and as it is an art therapy, it helped them emotionally too to express all types of emotions. These Mandalas are analysed by Philosophy Head of Department, Ms Simmin Bawa and students are further guided to make more Mandalas with variations. Students made Sufi Saints, Lord Shiva, Corona Virus, fairies, faces, peacocks, abstract mandalas and many other types of Mandalas. A very successful activity and effective activity.

Talks



The speaker for the talk on *Gender Implications of COVID 19-Women, Labour and the Informal Sector* was *Professor Vibhuti Patel*. She is a Professor at the Advanced Centre for Women's Studies, School of Development Studies, Tata Institute of Social Sciences, Mumbai. There were in all 248 participants from various colleges namely, Jai Hind College, Tata Institute of Social Sciences, St Xaviers, Vacha Trust, and there were mixed group of participants of lawyers, activists and NGOs.

The session gave an in-depth knowledge about how social distancing and stay at home orders have had a gender differential impact, concept and analysis. Prof Patel covered the issues such as Concept and analysis of women's work; Valuation of production and unproductive work, visible and invisible work; paid and unpaid work, economically productive and socially productive work – economic status, private property, women workers in the subsistence sector and industrial sector, Women's contribution to National Income, Factors affecting female entry in labour markets, work participation of women in agriculture, Non-agricultural rural activities, informal sector, cottage and small scale industries, organised industry, and services sector, Wage differentials in the labour market, Predicaments of women headed households-widows, single, deserted, divorced, households facing long term male migration, Determinants of Wage differentials; gender, education, skill productivity, efficiency, opportunity, Structures of wages across regions and economic sectors.

Where as the speaker for the talk on Food Processing, Food Security, Jobs & India's Prosperity was Mr Anantha Padmanabhan.

There was a discussion based on a Swedish company which was founded in 1883. It started in the separation of solutions and now deals in the production of specialised products and solutions for heavy industry. The products are used to heat, cool, separate and transport such products as oil, water, chemicals, beverages, foodstuffs, starch and pharmaceuticals. It traces the problem, from the inadequate production of food grains. A critical analysis of India's food security system was made in light of present day problems and Mr Anantha spoke about the strategies India needs to look in to enhance Agriculture related industries and start- ups. The future of jobs was discussed and how India could be made prosperous. The talk was followed by a discussion between Mr. Padmanabhan, Dr. Ashok Wadia and Mr. R N Bhaskar.
